Always an avid reader, she also loved the arts and helped support the Art Institute and the Steppenwolf Theater. A strong sense of curiosity nurtured her love of travel--both within and outside of the United States. Unfortunately--despite a life filled with various intellectual pursuits, MJ ultimately succumbed to Alzheimer's disease and has spent the last five years of her life at the Mosaic Lakeshore Healthcare Center. Throughout this time, she was able to retain a fair amount of her comprehension and her sharp sense of humor, but she suffered greatly from short-term memory loss.
